Project Description

The overall goal of this project is to advance equity and best practices for providing culturally appropriate, community-relevant solutions to the unique challenges faced by **newcomer and Indigenous parents** in accessing and navigating **autism-related** care in Ontario. These two populations have faced unique service access challenges and have benefited least from research to address their needs, so meaningful cross-learnings are expected. Through conducting extensive interviews with service providers and parents, our aim is to generate knowledge to ultimately improve access to autism-related care for newcomer and Indigenous communities.

While based at the <u>Laurier Autism Research Consortium</u> (Wilfrid Laurier University), this **job can be completed remotely from any location**, with **part-time flexible hours** dependent on the applicant's availability. The position will provide professional development opportunities for networking in the field of autism, as well as the development of diverse research skills, and the possibility of involvement with academic publications and presentations. We welcome and encourage applications from graduate students who may wish to combine this research as part of their own academic projects (e.g., theses).
